


Maps






Akilah Carter-Francique, CSSOR Distinguished Scholar Award


Dr. Akilah R. Carter-Francique (Ph.D., University of Georgia) joined Benedict College in the fall 2022 as the Dean of the School of Education, Health and Human Services. With 20 years of experience in higher education, an extensive research background, and a strong vision for leadership in the field of education, Carter-Francique served sporting spaces that center experiences of equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI).

Carter-Francique examines issues of race, gender, social class, and their intersections with sport, education, and society. She has presented at regional, national, and international conferences and written several articles and book chapters across academic disciplines to include being the co-editor of Athletic Experience at Historically Black Colleges and Universities: Past, Present, and Persistence and Critical Race Theory: Black Athletic Experiences in the United States.


